The summer camping season is starting to wrap up. This season saw several large projects completed and a couple others started. We are always staying busy!

The first major project to be completed is the remodel of the Cedar Valley Little Campground. Back sites have been moved and spaced out a bit better to accommodate larger camper sizes. These sites also received a bit of a facelift with



new electric pedestals, gravel pads, and an access road to accommodate campers. We were excited to have this remodel completed just in time for Labor Day campers!

At River Valley Wetland we completed tree and brush removal in order to move along with our habitat improvement project with the USFWS. Our next step for this project is to remove a layer of invasive reeds, canary grass, which is choking out more desirable wetland plants. This removal will help increase the amount of standing water in the



wetland in order to benefit waterfowl and other wetland species. This joint project has come a long way and will greatly benefit the wetland and animals that call it home.

A remodel of the Rochester Shelter should soon be finished! We have poured a new concrete countertop, replaced the sidewalk, and added a wider entrance on the south side in order to improve access for park users. Additionally, the shelter is getting a facelift with an enclosed ceiling and an exterior remodel! We are very excited for this remodel, as it will be a great improvement to a shelter that gets a lot of use!

As the main camping season wraps up, please keep in mind that our campgrounds remain open year-round; however, water will be shut off in all parks on October 15th. We look forward to seeing you in our parks!

#### **Creature Feature** Moose

While not typically found in Iowa, this critter is an occasional visitor to our state. It is the largest member of the deer family, the tallest North American land mammal, and the second heaviest! While other members of the deer family grow pointed antlers, male moose grow flatter palmate antlers. These are mostly solitary and browse and forage for food, both on land and in the water!

Adult moose can be nearly seven feet tall at the shoulder, with adult males being able to weigh upwards of 1500 lbs.! On males the antler spread can be between four feet and five feet across. A typical moose can eat up to 70 lbs. worth of food a day.

These animals are native to the colder parts of North America and Europe, though they have been spotted as far south as northern New Mexico!

#### **Fascinated by Fungi**

This summer we had the privilege of hosting a Fungal Foray at Townsend Wildlife Area with the Prairie States Mushroom Club, whose mission is to promote scientific and educational activities for fungi and foster an appreciation for these wondrous organisms all around us. Prairie States Mushroom Club president Sarah-DeLong Duhon acted as our identification expert and documented our finds!

During the hike we found several species of fungi, which acted as decomposers, breaking down woody debris and returning nutrients to

the soil. We also found several species of symbiotic fungi, which work in conjunction with nearby plants to exchange water and nutrients for food. Participants had a wonderful time exploring the woods and learning about the wide variety of fungi all around us. The woods hold a magical medley of mushrooms that come in all shapes, sizes, and colors, which are a delight to behold! These fascinating fungi are an integral and interesting part of our ecosystem.



#### **Summer Camp Connections**



#### **Mason Jar Terrariums**

Please have an adult help you with the following project

#### **Materials**

- Mason Jar with Lid
- Tweezers or forceps
- Small plants or moss
- Soi
- Gravel, pebbles, or sand

#### **Instructions**

- 1. Place your gravel, pebbles, or sand at the very bottom of your jar; this allows for drainage so plant roots aren't sitting in water.
- 2. Next, place your soil on top of your drainage material. If you are finding that your soil is falling through your drainage layer, you can add a section of clean screen between the layers to keep the soil in place.
- 3. Begin placing your plants! You can choose to make a single plant your focus and use others to enhance it or create a mini jungle; the choice is yours! Additionally, you can place small toys or decorations in your terrarium as well!
- 4. After adding your plants, water your terrarium lightly and seal. After watering, place in an area out of direct sunlight. Air it out every two weeks or so for about an hour and water lightly afterwards.
- 5. Enjoy!

#### Sunday, September 28th, Hunter Safety Education

Cedar County Conservation Office (713 E South Street, Tipton, Iowa) 8:00 am - 4:00 pm. This is a classroom course; attendees must be present for the entire class. This is not a field day course. Lunch will be provided. However, if you have a special diet, please feel free to bring a sack lunch. Hunter education is a mandatory program that is designed to introduce students to several lifelong skills that are important to many different types of outdoor recreational opportunities. The course teaches students basic survival and first aid skills, water safety, wildlife identification, the basics of wildlife management, hunting laws, and firearm and archery safety. Hunter education also stresses the importance of individual responsibility and outdoor ethics. Iowa law requires that anyone born after January 1, 1972 must be certified in hunter education before they are eligible to purchase an Iowa hunting license. You MUST pre-register for this class. 



### Wild Recipe: Goldenrod Tea

#### **Equipment**

- A pot or kettle to boil water
- Kitchen shears or a sharp knife and cutting board
- Tea ball (Optional)

#### **Ingredients**

- 2-3 tablespoons chopped fresh goldenrod flowers and leaves (or 2-3 teaspoons dried goldenrod)
- 2 cups boiled filtered water

#### Method

- 1. Collect goldenrod leaves & flowers from the top 6" to 12" of plants.
- 2. Rinse fresh leaves to remove dirt and bugs.
- 3. Chop or snip goldenrod into small pieces.
- 4. Place prepared goldenrod in a teapot or cup and cover with freshly boiled water.
- 5. Allow to steep 10-15 minutes.
- 6. Strain and enjoy!
