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Increasing Accessibility In Our Parks

Several important accessibility improvements were made throughout the parks this season with the main goal being to increase accessibility and safety for park users.

Red Oak Park received several improvements including a sidewalk around the playground and to the bathroom. In



addition to this we also put in a gravel pad for parking. These improvements have increased the usability of the area so that families are better able to enjoy the simple scenic beauty of Red Oak. While your there don't forget to check out the short path through the woods!

The playgrounds at Bennett, Cedar Valley, and Red Oak had new safety mulch put in. This mulch is ADA compliant and



helps increase the safety and usability for playground users. The playgrounds receive a lot of use, especially during the camping season and it is important to us that all users have a safe environment to enjoy.

A brand new staircase has been put in at the quarry overlook at Cedar Valley Park near the campground. This staircase allows easier access to the quarry overlook for wildlife viewing and fishing opportunities.

Last, but not least, the recent round of storms kept us busy with tree cleanup. The trails at Cedar Valley Park and the Hoover Nature Trail had several trees down that staff removed for user safety. Tragically a large walnut tree was lost at Massillon Park near the road through the park.



Creature Feature~ Periodical Cicada

Periodical cicadas emerge in North America in either 13 or 17 year cycles which alternate through the years depending on the brood and region. Periodical cicada groups have synced up their emergence into adulthood so that all members of a particular region emerge together for maximum survival. This year we are fortunate enough to have two such regional cycles sync up for a super emergence, which



hasn't happened since 1803! Periodical cicadas differ from our annual cicadas due to their synchronized mass emergence strategy and generally longer lifespan. While some annual cicadas emerge every year all periodical cicadas in a region emerge at once.

Cicadas spend most of their life underground feeding on tree roots for food. Once soil temperatures reach about 64°F at 12 to 18 inches in depth, the cicada nymphs emerge from the soil where they find a place to shed their shell and develop wings. Once they are able to fly and mating is complete the female cicadas lay eggs in the bark of young branches. When the eggs hatch the larval cicada will chew through the branch to fall to the ground where they will burrow down to a root and start the cycle over again.



Homemade Flower Press

Please have an adult help you with the following project

You will need:

1 1x6 board, 12 inches in length

4 3 1/2 inch carriage bolts

4 wing nuts the same size diameter as your bolts

4 washers to fit your bolts

A drill to make the holes in the wood for your bolts

Sandpaper

Wax paper or parchment paper

A flower to press

Steps

- 1. Cut your 1x6 board at 6 inches, enough to give two equal sized pieces
- 2. Mark and drill holes in each corner of your two board sections to accommodate your bolts, with all holes on one board being a little larger than the bolt diameter to allow your board to be removed easily.
- 3. Designate an inside of your boards, this will be the side that presses the flowers. Sand the inside you just designated smooth. This doesn't need to be perfect, just enough to not leave an impression your flowers.
- 4. Assemble your flower press by placing the carriage bolts through your boards, the head of the carriage bolt should rest on the side with the smaller holes. Place the washers and wing nuts on the bolts coming out of your top board.
- 5. When you are ready to press a flower place wax paper or parchment paper between the two boards of your press with the flower in between. Hand tighten your boards together and leave pressed for up to a couple weeks depending on your drying conditions.
- 6. Once dry your flower will be ready but use cation as the flower may be brittle from being dried and pressed

If they are on a tree it's mulberry and if its closer to the ground then it's wild raspberries!
