Wild Recipe

This season we continued the remodel of the Little Campground at Cedar Valley Park. Last fall we finished dirt work on the site to level out the back portion of the campground in order to accommodate campsite placement. This season we replaced old electric pedestals and ran waterlines to more spaced out sites. The original design of this campground had spaces more closely together than current camping units could reasonably accommodate. More often than not, modern camping units are much larger and wider than they were even twenty years ago, so larger and longer sites are needed to accommodate a growing user base.



As of right now, water is not connected to the campground, but laying the infrastructure

now makes it easier for future park improvements. We are always trying to think of ways to make future maintenance and park improvements easier.



Additionally, we have improved facilities at Shelter Two at Cedar Valley Park by putting in a permanent pit toilet. This new toilet is handicap accessible with a designated pull-up spot, concrete sidewalk and zeroentry stalls. One stall is fully ADA compliant for those park users with mobility issues, while the other stall is standard.

Camping season is in full swing, and we love seeing our regular users as well as new park guests. We try to keep our park users in mind when we are making improvements so that we may accommodate your growing needs.

Creature Feature~ Blanding's Turtle

Blanding's turtles are distinctive due to their domed shell and yellow chin. Blanding's turtles are medium-sized semi-aquatic turtles that can live as long as 70 years in the wild. This turtle is omnivorous, feeding on a variety of insects, plants, crustaceans, and even fish and frogs.

These turtles reach maturity at around 20 years old. Blanding's turtles mate from April through early May, with nesting season beginning in early June. They require large areas of habitat that include shallow wetlands surrounded by areas of well-drained soil for nesting.

Their range centers around the Great Lakes region, with populations being found from Nebraska to New York and southern Ontario to Indiana. Due to its needs for larger areas of habitat, the primary threat to the species is habitat fragmentation. This species is considered threatened here in Iowa.

Bridge Replacement on the Hoover Nature Trail

Running through West Branch to the town of Oasis is a 3.7-mile section of the Herbert Hoover Nature Trail, its foundation the repurposed railroad bed of the Rock Island Railroad, which once ran through the area. The Rock Island Railroad went bankrupt in 1980, but the bed was repurposed thanks to the hard work of local citizens in 1990 as a segment of the much larger Herbert Hoover Nature Trail, part of the Rails-to-Trails program. This multiuse trail allows users to view the surrounding nature as well as artifacts of the trail's past life as a rail line.

Aging infrastructure has led to the need to replace the old timber bridge on the trail. After years of use, the bridge has started to show signs of its age. In 2023, Director Mike Dauber applied for and received a State Recreation Trails Grant to help cover costs of bridge replacement. This project began in early June of 2025 and is expected to

be completed by the end of June. The new bridge will allow users to once again enjoy our section of the trail safely!

Partnering for Better Health

A new partnership project with the Iowa State Extension office has been completed! This project is part of the Leveraging Activities and Partnerships (LEAP) program designed to help promote health and well-being through Iowa. Six Iowa counties have partnered with LEAP; these counties are Cedar, Clinton, Crawford, Franklin, Muscatine, and Pottawattamie. The main focus of the LEAP program is to increase access to healthy food and increase accessibility to safe physical activity.

In the late summer of 2024, Erin Blackwell of the ISU Extension Office reached out to us about the program and potential partnership. We soon began with a planning and brainstorming session on how best our two agencies can promote the goals of LEAP in our parks. For our location, we landed upon the Cedar County portion of the Hoover Nature Trail for the location due to its high overall user base and accessibility to the community. We landed upon creating a way for individuals to create and

measure personal goals while on our trails. We decided that total distance traveled would be the best fit with the goals of the program, and the mile marker signs were decided upon as an easy way for people to measure their progress. Allie Taber took over the program in February of 2025 after Blackwell's departure. Both Erin and Allie contributed

greatly to the success of this partnership.

During the design process, we tried to stay true to the history of the location as a former railroad. This led to the design of the signs and lettering being reminiscent of those that would have been used at the time of the rails operation. While using the trail, you can see some of the historical infrastructure still present, allowing trail users to step into the past while enjoying nature at the same time.

We would like to thank the staff at the Iowa State Extension Office in Cedar County for the opportunity to be part of this program. It is our joy to help serve the community in getting out and enjoying the outdoors.

DIY Tiny Bug Viewer

Please have an adult help you with the following project

Materials

Scissors Graph Paper Clear Cling Wrap Tape Two Small Paper Cups A pencil A glue stick



- Cut the bottom out of your first cup with the scissors. Cut a section of cling wrap to cover the opening and attach it firmly to the bottom of your cup with tape on the outside edges.
- Trace the bottom of your second cup on a piece of graph paper. Cut this traced section out with your scissors and using the glue stick glue to the bottom of your second cup.
- 3. Find small insects to be examined and place them in the first cup and gently slide the second cup inside.
- 4. Watch your insects movements and enjoy!



Wild Recipe: Mulberry Syrup

Note: While the recipe calls for black mulberry any mulberry species will do

Equipment

- 1 Fine mesh strainer or cheesecloth
- 1 Large 4 quart non-reactive sauce pot
- 1 latex gloves optional, for squeezing juice from the berries

Ingredients

- 5 lbs Ripe black mulberries
- 1 cup Organic sugar or granulated sugar
- 2 Teaspoons fresh lemon juice for canning, optional
- 1 Tiny pinch Kosher salt roughly ¼-1/8 tsp

Method

1. Put the mulberries in a pot, cover and bring to a simmer over medium heat until hot and steaming, about 10 minutes. Mash the berries around with a potato masher or wooden spoon occasionally.

2. Once the berries are hot and mashed they'll have given up a lot of juice.

3.Pour the mulberries and their juice into a double thickness of cheesecloth over a strainer and allow to cool. Squeeze as much juice from the fruit as you can. If your fruit was clean you can save it to make jam. 4.Combine the juice with the sugar and salt, bring to a gentle simmer and cook for until reduced by 70% to 1.5

cups. This should take roughly 1.5 hours.

5. If you want to can the syrup, add the lemon juice now.

6.Pour the hot syrup into three four oz mason jars or another container. Srew on the lid and process in a water bath canner for 10 minutes. Remove the jars and cool, then label, date, and store in a pantry. 7.The syrup will last for years in the fridge or in the pantry and can also be frozen.
